RENOWNED SPEAKERS WILL ANALYSE THE HISTORIC
AND FUTURE RELATIONS BETWEEN MOROCCO,
SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.

For its 11th edition, the Gnaoua and World Music Festival's Human Rights Forum will address the theme of **"Morocco, Spain, Portugal: a history that looks to the future"**, on Friday June 28th and Saturday June 29th, 2024 at the Atlas Essaouira hotel.

Organized every year in partnership with the Council of the Moroccan Community Abroad (CCME), the forum invites leading figures from diverse backgrounds to debate freely in the context of three thematic panel discussions as well as a keynote address. For this edition, the keynote speaker will be former President of the Spanish Government, Mr. José Luis Rodriguez Zapatero.



In 2030, less than six years from now, Morocco, Spain and Portugal will conjointly organize the World Cup of football. This shared bid bears witness to the excellent relations shared by these three nations for over a thousand years, with variable but virtually uninterrupted human, economic and cultural flows. This shared history, however, has also been fraught with friction, even conflicts of all kinds.

The strengthening of economic and political relations between Morocco, Spain and Portugal as well as the joint organization of the 2030 World Cup represent real advances and clear opportunities for dialogue and cooperation. But the challenges facing the three countries have also changed, requiring greater cooperation, understanding and mutual respect.

In this context, what impact will the joint organization of the World Cup have on future relations between the three countries? What role can civil society, intellectuals, artists and sportsmen and women play? How will mobility evolve between the three countries? How does each diaspora speak of exile, of community and homeland? These are just some of the issues to be addressed in debate during the three thematic panels that include intellectuals, political figures, business and non-profit stakeholders from the three countries.

"The forum has always been attuned to the debates and issues that shape our societies. The organization of this World Cup is a major moment in our contemporary history. This year's forum is our way of participating in this moment, through the insights and contributions of leading personalities," explains Neila Tazi, producer, Gnaoua and World Music Festival in Essaouira.

Driss El Yazami, President of the Council of the Moroccan Community Abroad, concurs: "Given the new challenges facing the three countries, we will consider the roles of civil society, intellectuals, artists and athletes in building healthy and sustainable relationships. It is also important to explore the evolution of mobility in this part of the world. To understand how, among each of the diasporas, subjects such as exile, community and country, for example, are discussed," he concludes.
